ADVENT

The word Advent is from the Latin *adventus* for "coming" and is associated with the four weeks of preparation for Christmas. Advent always contains four Sundays, beginning on the Sunday nearest the feast of St. Andrew the Apostle, (November 30) and continuing until December 24. It blends together a penitential spirit, very similar to Lent, a liturgical theme of preparation for the Second and Final Coming of the Lord, called the "Parousia", and a joyful theme of getting ready for the Bethlehem event.

Since the 900s, Advent has been considered the *beginning* of the Church year. This does not mean that Advent is the most important time of the year; Easter has always had that honor.

The traditional color of Advent is purple or violet which symbolizes the penitential spirit.

COLLECTION FOR RELIGIOUS NEXT WEEKEND

The U.S. bishops' annual Retirement Fund for Religious collection will be held **Dec. 7-8** in parishes across the nation. Now in its 26th year, the collection benefits more than 34,000 senior Catholic sisters, brothers and religious order priests. The U.S. bishops initiated the collection in 1988 to address the significant lack of retirement funding among religious communities. Proceeds are distributed to eligible communities to help underwrite retirement and health care expenses. Since the collection began, Catholics have contributed \$698 million.

THE CHARITABLE IRA ROLLOVER IS BACK UNTIL DECEMBER 31!

The American Taxpayer Relief Act allows you to make a tax-free gift to the parish directly from your Individual Retirement Account (IRA). This means that you can give directly from your IRA to the parish without first having to recognize the distribution as income on your tax return. To be eligible for this favorable tax treatment, gifts are limited annually to \$100,000, you must be at least age 70½ when the gift is made, and contributions must be paid directly from the IRA. Charitable gifts made from an IRA count toward your IRA minimum required distribution.

ADVENT THOUGHTS

There was a time when the world awaited the Messiah. *Centuries* passed. Many people *stopped* watching and waiting. Many stopped being faithful to God, even though He had *revealed* Himself to the Hebrew people through prophets and by miraculous help from Heaven. But it *seemed* that one day was like any other, and that there was nothing new under the sun. In the fullness of time, however, God sent His Son. The time had come. Now, we number our years A.D.—the year of Our Lord.

The greatest joy for those who lived back then would have been to have recognized the Messiah. When Simeon held the baby Jesus, he said in joy, “Now, Lord, you can dismiss your servant in peace.” He was ready to die because he had seen and held—and recognized—the promised One.

On the other hand, what a great disappointment for all those who failed to recognize their Savior when He was in their midst! What a terrible thing it was to have actually *insulted* and *persecuted*, and then to have *killed* the very One who had come to save the world and each and every person in it! How horrible. They all knew of the prophecies that one day a Messiah would come, yet many did not watch for Him.

What about *us*? Jesus will not be born *again* as a baby. We are not watching and waiting for the Messiah to be born. He *was* born 2013 years ago. He redeemed humanity. He died and rose from the dead, never to die again. Yet, He has told us all to “Be watchful! Be alert!” Because Jesus will come again in glory.

Just as the time *did* come when He was born, the time *will* come when we will stand before our God. And how terrible if we do not recognize Him. How horrible it will be if we find that we have *persecuted* Him. How ashamed we shall be if we find that we have *ignored* Him, passed Him by, let him suffer and starve, hungry and cold, eventually to die unloved.

Be watchful! Be alert!

Jesus told us exactly how we will be judged: “Whatever you do to the least of those around you, you did to *me*.”

We should *watch* for opportunities to meet Jesus and to serve Him. We should be *alert* to Jesus “in the distressing disguise of the poorest of the poor” so that we will *recognize* him when He comes to us, and so that we might one day hear Him say, “Well done, good and faithful servant! Enter into your Master’s joy!”
