

THE TRINITY

"It is not easy to find a name that will suitably express so great an excellence, unless it is better to speak in this way: the Trinity, one God, *of whom* are all things, *through whom* are all things, *in whom* are all things.

Thus the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, and each of these by Himself, is God, and at the same time they are all one God; and each of them by Himself is a complete substance, and yet they are all one substance.

The Father is not the Son nor the Holy Spirit; the Son is not the Father nor the Holy Spirit; the Holy Spirit is not the Father nor the Son: but the Father is only Father, the Son is only Son, and the Holy Spirit is only Holy Spirit.

To all three belong the same eternity, the same unchangeableness, the same majesty, the same power. In the Father is unity, in the Son equality, in the Holy Spirit the harmony of unity and equality.

And these three attributes are all one because of the Father, all equal because of the Son, and all harmonious because of the Holy Spirit."

SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST HOLY TRINITY

After the Easter Season that ended last Sunday with Pentecost, the Liturgy has returned to "Ordinary Time". This does not mean, however, that Christians must be less any committed: indeed, having entered divine life through the sacraments, we are called daily to be open to the action of divine Grace, to progress in love of God and of neighbor. This Sunday of the Most Holy Trinity, in a certain sense sums up God's revelation which was brought about through the Paschal Mysteries: Christ's death and Resurrection, his Ascension to the right hand of the Father and the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. The human mind and language are inadequate to explain the relationship that exists between the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit; yet the Fathers of the Church sought to illustrate the mystery of the Triune God by living it with deep faith in their own lives.

The divine Trinity takes up his abode in us on the day of our Baptism: "I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit". Every time we sign ourselves with the sign of the Cross we remember God's name in which we were baptized. With regard to the sign of the Cross a theologian, Romano Guardini, remarked: "We do it before praying so that... we may put ourselves spiritually in order; focus thoughts, heart and will on God; after praying, so that what God has given us may remain within us.... It embraces the whole being, body and soul... and everything is consecrated in the name of the Triune God."

The sign of the Cross and the name of the living God therefore contain the proclamation that generates faith and inspires prayer. And just as in the Gospel Jesus promises the Apostles that: "When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth" (Jn 16: 13), so it happens in the Sunday Liturgy, from week to week, when priests dispense the bread of the Word and of the Eucharist. The Holy Curé d'Ars also reminded his faithful of this. "Who welcomed your soul?", he asked, "at the beginning of your life? The priest. Who feeds your soul and gives it strength for its journey? The priest. Who will prepare it to appear before God, bathing it one last time in the blood of Jesus Christ? The priest, always the priest."

Let us make our own the prayer of St Hilary of Poitiers: "Keep uncontaminated this upright faith that is in me and, until my last breath, grant me likewise this voice of my conscience, that I may be ever faithful to what I professed in my regeneration when I was baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

Ministries

**MINISTRY MEANS YOU....
AND THERE'S A PLACE FOR EVERYONE!**

A parish is only as successful in being a vibrant, welcoming Christian Community as are the clergy and parishioners who form it. And ministries, that is, ways of putting our gifts in service to Christ and one another, are the soul of any Christian community.

It is a firm teaching of the Scripture that every single baptized person receives from the Holy Spirit a “charism” (gift or talent) that is meant for the service of the Christian Community. There are no exceptions. If you are baptized, YOU have one of these gifts or talents. And they have been given to you so that YOU can do your part in promoting and supporting a relationship with Jesus among others and among us in our parish.

Usually a person can identify their gift from the Spirit by the attraction they have for a particular work or group. It can also be identified by others who tell you that you have a “knack” for this-or-that activity. I have heard people comment on what our parish needs, but so few who actually step up to the plate to help make this happen...how about YOU? Will you say “Yes!” to the Spirit’s gift and put it into service for the community? We especially need....

- Choir members, cantors and musicians to help lift our hearts to God in the Liturgy.
- Greeters for before Mass to hand out worship aids and give a friendly welcome.
- Hospitality ministers after Mass so that we can expand our fellowship on Sundays.
- Eucharistic Home Visitors to adopt one homebound parishioner and bring him/her weekly Holy Communion. You can arrange the day and time to suit your schedules.
- Additional members of the St. Vincent de Paul Society to provide food and assistance to the rapidly growing number of poor within our parish boundaries. They meet monthly and take turns serving the needy in pairs weekly.
- Catechists and increased enrollment on our Parish School of Religion. Do you feel an attraction to introducing children to Christ and accompanying them in this journey? Can you reach out to Catholic families you know who do not have their kids enrolled in religious instruction?
